Rain Gardens

Rain gardens are versatile features that can be installed in almost any unpaved space throughout the Loch Lomond subdivision. A rain garden is a depressed, landscaped garden

planted with native plant species that is designed to retain and infiltrate stormwater runoff from individual residential or commercial lots, sump pumps and roofs.

- Reduces runoff volumes and rates.
- Recharges groundwater and stream base flows
- Filters runoff pollutants
- Rain gardens have been used along streets to reduce and filter street runoff
- Can increase aesthetic value for the properties
- Provides wildlife habitat
- Typically low maintenance



 Rain Gardens may use landscape fabric or black plastic to limit weeds or until plants need more room to spread.



Rain Garden after 3 inches of rain! —>








Plant Native Plants

- Native plants are beneficial for Rain Gardens.
- Native plants filter sediments, nutrients, and pollutants from residential runoff
- Deeper roots of native plants (up to 15 feet)
 - Filter runoff much better than turf grass;
 - Help to hold the soil and reduce erosion;
 - Provide important habitats for nesting animals;
 - Enhance positive aesthetic views, add screening with flowers, shrubs, & trees;
 - Minimizing impacts of human activities.
