Spring Reminders

from the Lake Management Committee

The Lake Management Committee continues to research and use different methods to improve our lake water quality. There are two very simple things that we can do as residents to make an impact on the health of our lake: 1) reduce fertilizer usage and 2) deter geese.

One of the issues with our lake water quality is an excess amount of phosphorous which promotes the overgrowth of algae. A major reason for this excess phosphorous is fertilizer usage within our community. Leaves and grass clippings are two additional sources of phosphorus. You can help decrease the amount of phosphorous that washes into our lake by significantly reducing or completely eliminating the use of fertilizer on your lawn. A well established lawn needs little to no fertilizer to remain healthy. Keep in mind that 60% of the rainwater runoff entering our lake is from our neighborhood. Rain carries leaves, debris and other runoff from the streets into the lake. As this organic matter decays, it acts like food for algae in the water. So, whether you live on or off the lake, chemicals you put on your lawn will most likely end up in our lake. We can all help limit the growth of algae in the lake by raking and sweeping leaves and grass clippings out of the curbsides, gutters, and storm drains as you clean up your yard this season. You may have heard the terms "rain garden" or "buffer strip". Both of these are types of gardens you can plant in your yard to naturally filter rainwater runoff.

Another issue with our lake is the presence of e.coli. Geese feces is the biggest contributor. You can help reduce the amount of geese feces in our lake by keeping geese fencing intact at both beaches. If you are a lakefront homeowner we need you to keep the geese off your lawn. This can be done by putting up easy to install garden fencing on your shoreline especially if you have cut down your native buffer strip. Once the geese build a nest on your lawn they will remain on our lake for a few months until the goslings are old enough to fly. We want to discourage this at all costs.

Get Involved

ADOPT-A-BEACH-Volunteers needed for the Adopt-a-Beach program. This program was formed in 2023 and was a huge success. We are once again seeking families and individuals to adopt South Beach for a one week timeframe starting in Spring through the Fall. The time commitment is minimal. Responsibilities include checking the area for damage, ensuring goose fencing is up, moving the recycle bins to the curb and emptying the garbage cans to the dumpster. ADOPT-A-GARDEN-Loch Lomond has many beautiful native gardens in our common areas. This initiative began almost twenty years ago with many volunteers and grants from Stormwater Management of Lake County. We need help to keep these areas looking their best. We are looking for gardeners to be comfortable helping out by adopting one of our gardens at North or South Beach. We have buffer strips at both beaches that would require a team of two or three to monitor throughout the season. cleanup, weeding, and thinning might be required. Mentoring will be provided if needed. We have two buffer strips at South Beach and two at North Beach. North Beach also has a water-wise garden, a monarch waystation and a pollinator pocket that last year had annuals and natives. South Beach has a flagpole garden as well as the buffer strips.
